

What is the PE and sport funding?

As of 2013 the government allocated a sum of money to all primary schools to allow for schools and individuals within schools to improve P.E, by whatever means they deemed necessary e.g. through P.E. coordinator and/or staff training, purchasing additional /extra resources, purchasing out of house P.E. services etc. The changes have to be sustainable and leave a lasting legacy rather than being short-term fixes that will cease to exist if the funding is stopped.

As a school, Newton Regis has used the funding as part of the sports premium to continue to use a sports specialist company to deliver P.E lessons twice a week to all classes. This ensures each child is receiving high quality PE lessons and continues up skilling teachers by sharing and discussing good practice during and after the lessons. A Sports Coach is also used at school during lunch times, four days per week, working with each class as an 'Inspire to Compete Lunch Club'. A play leader is also used at lunchtime to facilitate organised games, for five days per week. The aim of this is to introduce new sports and practice a variety of sport with the classes, supporting them to take part in competitions throughout the year as well as encouraging sport for enjoyment and healthy exercise.

There are a number of factors to take into account when using the sports premium funding, including Ofsted inspection guidance which state the following factors for consideration:

1. The increase in participation rates in such activities as games, dance, gymnastics, swimming and athletics
2. The increase and success in competitive school sports
3. How much more inclusive the physical education curriculum has become
4. The growth in the range of traditional and alternative sporting activities
5. The improvement in partnership work on physical education with other schools and other local partners
6. Links with other subjects that contribute to pupils' overall achievement and their greater social, spiritual, moral and cultural skills
7. The greater awareness amongst pupils about the dangers of obesity, smoking and other such activities that undermine pupils' health

and the 5 key indicators/objectives from the DfE, which are included in the table of spending on the next page.
